A MOMENT TO PAWS...

Dear PHS Parents and Families:

We are off to a very smooth start of the year at Providence. Now that we are at the half-way mark of the first quarter, we are settling into a routine. We are so excited to have the students back in-person on campus. Teachers have been assessing students to determine gaps in learning that occurred during the year we were on remote instruction or hybrid instruction. Now that we know specifically what the gaps and weaknesses are, we are planning targeted instruction to help our students improve their knowledge and skills. Some students have larger areas of “unfinished learning” than others, so teachers are requesting/requiring students to come to after school tutoring. We appreciate the help of parents to monitor their child’s progress and support the teacher as he/she works to make sure all of their students achieve.

Even though we had an unprecedented year last year with remote learning lasting until fourth quarter, and then hybrid learning for the remainder of the year, the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction (NC DPI) continued to require End-of-Course (EOC) tests and publicly reported data. Here are our achievements:

- Providence students had the **HIGHEST test scores in all four EOCs** (Math I, Math III, English 2, and Biology) of any high school in CMS. This is the proficiency rate. Growth was not determined by our DPI for last year.
- Providence had the **2nd HIGHEST Graduation Cohort Rate** in CMS. Our rate was 94.9% for the Class of 2021. Another school had a rate of greater than 95%. We don’t like to come in 2nd place. It gives us pause to double check our strategies and make sure our seniors stay on track to graduate on time with their cohorts. No “senioritis” allowed...at least not to the point it puts their graduation in jeopardy.

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As soon as we have comparison data for ACT, SAT, and AP exams, I'll share that with you. I am very proud of the hard work of our teachers and students last year. You could see the **impact** of the strong teaching and learning that occurs at our school, even when we were closed to in-person learning.

We have a staff of the most wonderful teachers assembled. Of course, I am partial because I get to work with them each day, but I have also had an opportunity to observe teachers around the state and I know that our teachers are the BEST. Most of our classes are full this year. Even though Providence was closed to transfer students, we have had a number of students move into our home zone, so we are over capacity currently. We are doing well with our new students and they are acclimating quickly to Providence.

At school, we have embedded Sources of Strengths strategies into our classrooms as well as planned for several major campaigns and a few smaller campaigns this year. Our Sources of Strength Peer Leader team consists of over 60 students who are working well to emphasize the eight Sources of Strengths for our students and staff. Coming out of the pandemic, where students had been isolated at home and away from their school routine, we have found that we need to emphasize personal wellness and care. We are working toward teaching our students how to do that as they balance their academic and extra-curricular work load.

Recently we announced that we have 16 seniors who have qualified as Semifinalists in the 2022 National Merit Scholarship Competition. Last week, we also received notification that 10 of our seniors have been named Commended Students by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation on the basis of their high school PSAT tests as juniors. Congratulations to the following students: **Iksha Anil, Henry Brown, Alexander Howard, Aditya Kumar, Claire Lyons, Benjamin Malone, Caleb Meacham, Girish Rengadurai, Zachary Schuler, and Regan Westover.**

We will keep working hard, and we thank you for entrusting your child to us. I hope you find this issue full of the good news happening at Providence.

MARCHING BAND

The Pride of Providence Marching Band has been hard at work preparing its 2021 production "CheckMate!" since the beginning of August. It has been a thrill to have our students back on campus together doing what they enjoy! The students had a wonderful band camp in the first two weeks of August. During this time, we introduced to our new students (and reintroduced to our veterans) the basics and fundamentals of marching and choreography. As the foundation was laid, we began learning the specific music, drill spots, and choreography for this year's production.

This year's production uses the visual concept and iconography of the game of chess. However, we utilize the metaphor of the game of chess to Kings and Queens and royalty, along with battle, in our musical selections. The band will use "Inferno" from composer Robert W.
