

Dear PHS Parents and Families:

As we close out the first semester, we have an opportunity to reflect on how things are going and how they have progressed at Providence. School is running very smoothly, even though we have had some real challenges with the nation-wide teacher shortage causing very large classes at Providence. In addition, we are challenged by the "unfinished learning" some students have due to school closure during the Pandemic. We have a number of new students and students new to the country. We are creatively working to meet all of these challenges. I'm so proud of the progress our students are making and for their efforts. Our teachers are doing an awesome job at working with them.

At school, we are continuing to focus on teaching college and career-ready skills that students need to have before they graduate. We are embedding these learning experiences into every class. As we have visits or receive emails from our graduates who are now in college, we are always eager to hear what skills were taught at Providence which are most helpful in college. Responsibility, organization, being able to read the text and discern the important details, as well as research and writing skills are the top ones our former students explain are most helpful. The junior paper (even though those words might strike anxiety in most 11th graders) has been a process we have heard was very helpful to our graduates in their first year in college. One student told us that she has written several research papers similar to what was expected in the "junior paper" in her first semester in college. Another student said that college was really hard, but he was "absolutely" prepared because of what he learned at Providence. One of our current students who is also enrolled in the dual enrollment program at community college, eagerly announced to her class that she's going to ace her community college course because of what she has already learned at Providence. This is music to our ears.

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In addition to college readiness, we have also focused on career readiness and job-market skills. Our new Career Development Coordinator, Ms. Folk, has been working with students to find internships, explore career inventories, and consider job opportunities or career fields.

We know that there is always room for growth with our students and within our school. We will continue to work hard so the results continue to be noteworthy and the students reap the benefits of a strong, comprehensive high school education. This semester, in addition to the other accolades received from the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction which I shared with parents earlier in the year, we have been recognized for the following accomplishments:

- The <u>HIGHEST</u> performing comprehensive High School in CMS with a score of 93 and grade of A (the highest grade that can be earned).
- We <u>EXCEEDED Expected Growth</u>, which means that students grew more than they were predicted to grow (based on their individual state test scores from previous years). We are most proud of this achievement. "Growth" is an indicator that the state uses to determine the difference between the performance a student should make in a course as compared to their actual performance in a course.
- ALL of our subgroups (White, Asian, Black, Hispanic, Economically Disadvantaged, Multilingual Learners, and Students with Disabilities) <u>EXCEEDED Expected Growth</u>.
- The <u>HIGHEST Advanced Placement exam (AP)</u> pass rate of any comprehensive high school in CMS (84.5%).
- The <u>HIGHEST average SAT score</u> of any comprehensive high school in CMS (average score of 1244).
- The <u>HIGHEST ACT average</u> in CMS (average score of 24.5).

There is no school quite like Providence High School. We are the best school in CMS and among the top in NC and the country. But, I want to highlight something else that makes our school special. The athletic, fine arts, and extra-curricular opportunities in which our students are involved create a full, comprehensive environment for students to develop leadership, teamwork, and other skills. This edition of the Paw Prints is full of recent honors, awards, and activities featuring our students. I hope you enjoy reading all about them.

Thank you for sharing your children with us and thank you for helping us make our first semester a huge success. Go Panthers!


MCKENNA MARTIN

SPANISH CLUB




